Simple Tools for Raising Healthy Children

Some things in life come with instructions, but children are not one of these. We are often left to figure out how to support children to make sure they grow up healthy and happy. Sometimes we parent the way we were parented, which is not always the best way. Sometimes we try and try, but struggle to balance work, family, relationships, finances, and time with friends. Here are a few tips on being the best father you can be.

- Prioritize Your Life- Make children a top priority because they need you to be active in their lives.
- Tell The Truth-Children watch how you deal with tough situations. If they see you not being truthful, they will do the same.



Actions Speak Louder Than Words-

Children carefully watch you from the time they can see you clearly (about 2 months old). From how your facial expressions match your tone of voice to how you speak to others, children learn more from what you do than what you say. Be the kind of man you want your daughter to marry or son to hang out with.
